BIRDS IN OUR BACK YARD





Excerpt from article Birds In Our World by Keith Ireland.

In Australia we have three different types of Frogmouth, so named because of their bills which could be compared to that of a frog. The Tawny Frogmouth is the one that is most widespread being found all over the continent. Large numbers live in Central Queensland and may be spotted sitting quietly in a tree, usually fairly high up.

The Marbled Frogmouth is quite rare, being mainly found only in far north Cape York. The Papuan Frogmouth has been only recorded in Cape York.

I have been fortunate in being able to photograph the Tawny variety on a number of occasions. One of the most interesting was when one had a nest only a few metres from the verandah of a friend's home. After the two babies had hatched and had some plumage, I sat on their verandah with my camera on the tripod waiting for them all to open their eyes. One would open its eyes but the others didn't.

It wasn't until a vehicle pulled up down below and the curiosity of the whole three birds was too much for them. All three had to look down which was when I took the attached photo. The results were worth the effort.
